NAEGA Clause 20

NAEGA issued an additional clause 20 certificate regarding winter weather in New Orleans from January 28 to January 29. The winter weather caused stoppages in the normal course of labor due to the closure of the local USDA GIPSA field office.

Furthermore, separate panels were established, and have denied clause 20 requests resulting from a natural gas pipeline explosion in the Pacific Northwest and an oil spill that caused the lower Mississippi River to close. Currently we have one panel formed and deciding if Canadian rail delays are exceptional impediments to transportation, and we will soon be establishing a panel for an oil spill in Houston.

On May 8th, NAEGA, NGFA, and many other business groups signed a letter addressed to the International Longshore and Warehouse Union and Pacific Maritime Association urging both parties to come to a new contract before the current contract expires on June 30, and avoid a lockout of the West Coast port. A failure to come to an agreement would have serious interruptions to the supply chain.

U.S. – Support for Appointment of USTR Ag Negotiator

NAEGA has expressed its support for Darci Vetter’s nomination as Chief Agricultural Negotiator in the Office of the United States Trade Representative (USTR). To demonstrate this support, NAEGA joined a number other food and agricultural organizations in a letter recommending Ms. Vetter be confirmed as Chief Agricultural Negotiator to all members of the Senate Finance Committee. Ms. Vetter testified as part of the confirmation process before the Senate Finance Committee on May 8th.

World – Combustible Dust

NAEGA continues to address action on dust explosion hazards by the United Nations (UN) *Globally Harmonized System* of Classification and Labelling of Chemicals (*GHS*). A key meeting of the relevant GHS sub-committee is scheduled for Geneva on July 2-4

During recent meetings to prepare for the July meeting in Geneva, an important and controversial positions on how the GHS should proceed regarding combustible. A GHS correspondence group will meet in Geneva and primarily focus technical discussions in order to develop a scope of application, definition, classification criteria and hazard communication elements.

NAEGA Senior Advisor Jerry Cotter will attend the meeting as a representative of NAEGA counterpart the International Cry Bulk Terminals Association. Jerry will recommend only guidance material be developed. Representatives of all European Countries have joined the call for guidance material. However, U.S. Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) continues to press for the GHS contain a standard setting full chapter be developed for the GHS Purple Book or added to the Annex or has been suggested by an alternative to a as well as every European representative. Proponents of the guideline (rather than standard setting) point out that combustible dust is covered under existing workplace standards and that further regulations will cause confusion.

As indicated in the Wall Street Journal article last month, OSHA acknowledged that it will take "years" before they develop an entirely new combustible dust standard. It appears the U.S. agency has decided to use two other venues to develop a standard; The U.S. National Fire Prevention ACT (NFPA) and the GHS. NGFA and others are involved related U.S. litigation impacting the use of NFPA. If OSHA loses that litigation, the U.S. agency would turn toward the GHS sub-committee

to establish the new standard they seek. On the other hand, if they were to win the litigation, they will still need a uniform definition to include into the standard. Right now, they are using multiple NFPA standards as the primary source for their definitions. Either way, the UN GHS and NFPA provide OSHA with the means to creating a formal definition that leads to the establishment of an enforceable standards without the burden of creating an entirely new standard via the establish U.S. regulatory process.

We expect the July meeting to result in a document for GHS sub-committee consideration at its December 2015 meeting.

The United States Department of Agriculture’s (USDA) Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) announced proposed changes to the fees it charges to recoup the costs of conducting agricultural quarantine inspections (AQI) at U.S. ports of entry and overtime rates worked by APHIS officers. APHIS indicates adjustments are essential for the AQI program to

have the financial stability it needs to continue the critical work of keeping U.S. agriculture safe and productive agriculture.

The [proposed AQI fee](#) structure ensures that no one party pays more than the costs of the services they incur. APHIS is proposing to add a \$2 fee per sea passenger to recover costs associated with inspecting cruise vessels and passenger baggage, and to add a \$375 fee to recover the costs of APHIS services for monitoring the application of or providing treatments to imported cargo to minimize pest risks. APHIS also proposes to raise user fees for inspections of commercial trucks with a transponder from \$105 to \$320 a year, and commercial trucks without a transponder from \$5.25 to \$8 per crossing.

APHIS is also concurrently proposing to adjust the hourly rates charged when APHIS employees perform work associated with AQI activities on Sundays, holidays or other after-hours periods so APHIS can recover the true cost of providing the services. The overtime rates would be raised commensurate with the anticipated cost of providing AQI services through 2018. [This proposed rule](#) will also be available for a 60 day comment period. This is the first proposed change to overtime rates since 2002.

New Issues & Opportunities for NAEGA Consideration

U.S. – Vermont GM Labeling Law

The state of Vermont passed a law that mandates genetically modified (GM) foods must be labeled as such, and was signed by Governor Shumlin last week. Vermont is the first state to pass a mandatory GM labeling law, although Maine and Connecticut have both passed labeling laws but contain a “trigger clause,” which means the laws would not take effect until a specific number of neighboring states adopted similar laws. Vermont’s legislation contained no such stipulation.

The law is anticipated to be challenged in court for its infringement on commercial speech by compelling companies to label their products. Furthermore, the Grocery’s Manufacture Association (GMA), NGFA, and other food and agriculture groups are leading federal legislation that would pre-empt state laws such as Vermont’s.

U.S.-Russia – U.S. to Drop Russia from GSP

President Obama announced May 7th his intentions to withdraw the designation of Russia as a beneficiary developing country under the Generalized System of Preference (GSP). Such a move could escalate tensions with Moscow but could also help pave the way for a renewal of GSP, which would benefit U.S. importers of nearly 5,000 products from more than 120 countries.

The Obama administration has been under pressure to reinstate GSP from the U.S. business community, which says domestic manufacturers have lost sales and laid off workers because they have been paying an extra \$2 million a day in tariffs on inputs sourced abroad that largely cannot be procured in the U.S. However, the fact that Russia is currently a GSP beneficiary has been one of the factors cited by lawmakers as standing in the way of a GSP reauthorization. Once that is no longer the case, members of Congress could find it politically easier to renew the program.
