#### **NAEGA Action Items:**

China, Soybean Buying Team – On February 15, the U.S. Soybean Export Council (USSEC) is hosting a Chinese Soybean Buying Team for a "Sino-U.S. Agricultural Trade Cooperation Conference & Soybean Contract Signing Ceremony" in Des Moines, Iowa. NAEGA member representatives will be taking part in the ceremony and will give the Chinese team a brief introduction to NAEGA.

U.S., NAEGA Recommendation for GIPSA Advisory Committee – NAEGA has joined with the National Grain and Feed Association (NGFA) in submitting a letter to USDA's Grain, Inspection, Packers and Stockyards Administration (GIPSA), supporting the application of Maria Reinitz of Gavilon Grain to serve on GIPSA's Grain Inspection Advisory Committee. The letter notes that NAEGA and NGFA find Maria to be an excellent candidate to "support your interest in securing committee members to help GIPSA better meet the needs of its customers who operate in a dynamic and changing marketplace". #### **RELATED NEWS:**

Treasury Department Publishes International Boycott List – The Department of the Treasury has published a current list of countries which require or may require participation in, or cooperation with, an international boycott. The list includes Kuwait, Lebanon, Libya, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Syria, United Arab Emirates and Yemen. Iraq is not included on the list, but its status with respect to future lists remains under review by the Department of the Treasury. U.S. companies that do business with these countries are required to file an annual International Boycott Report (IBR) with their federal tax returns. IBR's are required of U.S. taxpayers to report operations in, with, or related to, countries participating in boycotts not sanctioned by the U.S. government. Covered operations include any business or commercial transactions, even if they do not generate income. The full notice is available online at the Federal Register.

**Federal Agencies Issue Semiannual Regulatory Agenda** – U.S. Government Agencies have released their semiannual review of their regulatory agendas. Items of interest to NAEGA Members are:

- USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) potential next steps on new regulations on the "Introduction Of Organisms And Products Altered Or Produced Through Genetic Engineering". APHIS has not yet announced a next step for the proposed regulations, which would revise the regulations regarding the importation, interstate movement, and environmental release of certain genetically engineered organisms in order to bring the regulations into alignment with provisions of the Plant Protection Act. The revisions would also update the regulations in response to advances in genetic science and technology.
- APHIS is preparing a proposed rule to revise its regulations regarding the movement of plant pests. The revised regulations would address the importation and interstate movement of plant pests, biological control organisms, and associated articles, and the release into the environment of biological control organisms. The revision would also address the movement of soil and establish regulations governing the biocontainment facilities in which plant pests, biological control organisms, and associated articles are held. This proposal would clarify the factors that would be considered when assessing the risks associated with the movement of certain organisms, facilitate the movement of regulated organisms and articles in a manner that also protects U.S. agriculture, and address gaps in the current regulations.

New Mechanical Seal Standard for Cargo Containers – U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) recently advised members of the Customs-Trade Partnership Against Terrorism (C-TPAT) that effective March 1 the current International Organization for Standardization (ISO) mechanical seal standard, ISO/PAS 17712, will be replaced with new standard, ISO 17712:2010. CBP is not requiring C-TPAT participants to discard any high-security container seals that may not comply with the new standard that are currently in stock but is encouraging them to purchase compliant seals when their existing stocks are exhausted. CBP also states that when C-TPAT companies transition to new seals they should request documentation (lab reports) to confirm that the seals comply with the new standard.

CBP states that the updated standard includes the following requirements: testing to determine a seal's classification for physical strength (as a barrier of entry), process auditing of the manufacturer's security-related business practices, testing (pass/fail) of a seal's ability to indicate evidence of tampering, and a new 18mm minimum width diameter for bolt seals. CBP adds that benefits of complying with the revised standard include a reduced possibility of cargo theft or tampering, fewer shipping delays resulting from missing or broken seals, and easier detection of compromised seals.

**CBP Requests Public Comments on Information Collection** – U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) is requesting public comments on the proposed extension without change of the following information collections.

• CBP Form 300, Bonded Warehouse Proprietor's Submission: This form is filed annually by each warehouse proprietor, and the information thereon helps CBP determine all

- bonded merchandise that was entered, released and manipulated in the warehouse. <u>Click</u> here for CBP notice.
- Country of Origin Marking Requirements for Containers or Holders: Each imported article of foreign origin or its container must be marked with the English name of the country of origin in a conspicuous place as legibly, indelibly and permanently as the nature of the article or container permits. Click here for CBP notice.

Comments are due no later April 9. Details on submission requirements are available on each CBP notice.
